SAN ISABEL SCOUT RANCH

San Isabel Scout Ranch is a special resource available to the Pathway to the Rockies Council Scouting community for unit outdoor activities and camping experiences. Cub Packs, Scout Troops, and Venture Crews are all encouraged to use the area and may be there simultaneously. It provides an area developed with many amenities of a full Scout camp with available areas extending into undeveloped National Forest. Units have the freedom to set up their own program restricted from public or other private activities. However, some rules are necessary for safe use and to preserve the area and facilities.

The following rules apply to all who use San Isabel Scout Ranch:

1. All property users must conduct themselves in accordance with the principles contained in the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and Safe Guide to Scouting. The Scout Outdoor Code including the "Leave No Trace" program must be used while on the San Isabel Scout Ranch and surrounding National Forest lands.
2. Vehicles and trailers may be driven to the campsites or parked in the designated parking areas. Vehicle movement within SISR should be limited only for essential use and projects. Damages caused by a vehicle need to be recovered as best possible and reported to the ranch coordinator.
3. Private ATVs and UTVs (side-by-sides) are generally not permitted. Exceptions may be allowed for special requirements, but the operators must have completed the Council's ATV/UTV training.
4. Follow the "Leave No Trace" camping practices. All trash and garbage generated by a group must be packed out and taken home. No dumpster is available for unit trash.
5. Participants must bring their own drinking and cooking water **unless the water system has been turned on and is CERTIFIED SAFE TO DRINK**. Check with the area coordinator.
6. **NO PETS** are permitted on the SISR property. Handicap Assistance dogs are permitted. We love our pets but want to keep them and wildlife safe.
7. Wildlife is prevalent on SISR including bears and mountain lions. Under no circumstances should wildlife be harassed or chased. It's the unit's responsibility to ensure their members are aware of and use safe wilderness practices. Food and 'smellables' must be securely stored at all times. No hunting or trapping is permitted unless part of the hunting program.
8. Ground fires may be permitted in fire rings or fire barrels in designated campsites if no area fire ban is in place. Propane stoves and propane grills are recommended for cooking. Buddy-heater type warmers are not permitted in any tent or enclosed unit and must be supervised like cooking grills. Units must provide a minimum of two (2) 5-gallon containers of water near fires, stoves, and grills. Fires must be attended at all times and extinguished to Smoke Bear standards by stirring coals and then putting hands on ashes to make sure the fire is **TOTALLY** out. Clean up and put ashes in a fire barrel before you depart.

9. Firearms and fireworks are not permitted.
10. No trees may be cut down unless specifically approved in advance by the ranch coordinator or Council Ranger.
11. The lake is not authorized for swimming. Boating activities may be permitted if approved during registration. The names and copies of training cards for Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat must be included at registration and present with trained personnel at the lake during aquatic activities. An adult must be present when youth are at the lake.
12. Fishing is permitted. Units are encouraged to use good fish handling and catch-and-release practices. Fish creel limits are one Rainbow or one Cutbow Trout per individual that they have caught. Brook Trout and Grass Carp are to be released immediately. An adult must be present when youth are at the lake.
13. Cell phone service is limited to isolated spots on the Ranch. WiFi access may be given to Unit leaders for emergency communications.
14. Rock climbing is only permitted under supervision of a certified climbing instructor and with specific permission for the event by the Risk Management Committee. Scouts should not be in the rock-climbing area.
15. A special \$250 cleaning fee will be assessed if foreign objects (rocks or sticks, trash, garbage, diapers, hygiene pads, etc.) are found in the vault toilets.
16. Service and conservation projects are available and should be requested in advance of arrival.

To help us monitor the conditions and prioritize improvements, we ask that you submit a written report following your event. Send it to Jim Mendenhall at jmesct66@gmail.com. We would like to know:

- the actual numbers of Scouts and Scouters attending your event and how many nights they stayed
- the number of service hours your unit performed while camping at SISR and the type of work completed
- which campsite you used and its condition
- any other issues, concerns, or recommendations that you observe are welcome.
